
# Alberta's Response To The Opioid Crisis

### **Saving Lives: Naloxone**

More than 57,000 naloxone kits have been distributed to Albertans, Naloxone temporarily reverses overdoses and allows people to seek emergency care.




#### **Distribution Sites**

More than **1,500 sites** distribute naloxone kits across the province, including pharmacies.

#### **Overdose Reversals**


More than 3,600 overdose reversals have been voluntarily reported by people replacing their used kits, as of March 31, 2018. Far more overdose reversals are likely taking place across Alberta.

#### **Treatment: Medication**

More than **8,400 Albertans** are on medication-assisted treatment for opioid use (2017/18), which provides methadone or Suboxone to people to help prevent withdrawal and reduce cravings.

## **New Clinics and Expanded Programs**

New publicly-run opioid clinics and expanded treatment programs will serve up to 3,500 additional patients each year. That's more than triple the 1,000 patients Alberta's public opioid dependency clinics could serve in January 2017.
